

Undergraduate Child Protection Curriculum in the Southeastern United States

Background

- In 2022, CPS received over 4.2 million referrals of alleged maltreatment and investigated 2.1 million cases involving 3.1 million children (U.S. Department of Health & Human Services, 2024).
- Social Work and Psychology are the two most popular bachelor's degrees among frontline child protection workers. Yet, both majors were found to have higher turnover rates than a group of all other bachelor's degrees in a study of Kentucky CPS caseworkers (Yankeelov et al., 2009).
- A previous review of undergraduate coursework done in 2006 found that only 29% of the 1416 universities offered at least one course related to the area of child maltreatment (Johnson, 2015; Vieth et al., 2012).
- Undergraduate education on child maltreatment and training for mandated reporting and child protection work is lacking, with many students reportedly receiving no education before their onthe-job training (Vieth et al., 2019).
- Zero Abuse Project's Child Advocacy Studies (CAST) program aimed to create a standardized multi-disciplinary curriculum for future child-serving professionals and has grown to 92 CAST programs across 30 states (Vieth et al., 2019; Zero Abuse Project, 2023).
- The efficacy of the CAST curriculum has been well established. Parker et al. (2020) found that undergraduate CAST students were better at analyzing a complex polyvictimization case study than current child protection professionals across all experience levels.

Objectives

- 1. Evaluate the amount of child maltreatment coursework available to undergraduate students in psychology and social work bachelor's programs within the Southeastern U.S.
- 2. Explore trends and share state-level data for SE states.

Method

- Generated a list of all bachelor programs in Psychology and Social Work using the NCES College Navigator database.
- **Data Entry Procedure:** Florida Tech undergraduate and graduate psychology student research assistants entered college, program, and course information on postsecondary institutions into a Qualtrics form following a standardized protocol.


Phase 1: College Information: Entered college demographics provided by NCES database

Phase 2: Program Information: Used NCES site to code relevant program areas and degree programs offered by the college

<u>Phase 3: Course Information</u>: Searched, evaluated, coded, and entered course information available on the college's website (i.e., course catalog) relevant to child maltreatment, child protection, and child advocacy.

Conclusions

- Few psychology programs provide undergraduate students with child protection relevant courses, while most social work programs do.
 - Southeast Region: 10.2% of undergraduate psychology programs offer at least one undergrad child protection course compared to 82.4% of social work programs
 - U.S. Overall: Psych = 17.3%; SW = 68.7%
- Social work bachelor's programs in the Southeastern region of the United States provide more targeted child protection education opportunities than in other U.S. regions.
- Further implementation of child advocacy courses in psychology bachelor's programs is necessary to prepare future child protection professionals.
